Hello Members,

It's that time of year, when as a Club, we organize our Teaching Teams and advertise our classes to the members and the public. One new feature you've heard about "Blended Learning."

In fact, this Fall-Winter Ann and I taught the America's Boating Course using Zoom as our primary venue. Our class joined together, in-person, for the Review and Exam at the Community Center. We took some time to review the Knots we had presented to the class online. Although we had some great Virtual Classes, it was great seeing our students in person.

After the ABC session we immediately began an Virtual (fully interactive) Class for Piloting. This was a new adventure for us. It involved lots of planning and testing, but since everyone passed with flying colors, we are even more then ever convinced that Virtual Interactive Sessions can work. With 'time' being a premium these days, Virtual Interactive Classes can be a plus for students and instructors alike.



# **Safety Article**



## Weather Flash: "Spring Storm Approaching" Translates: "Rough Boating Weather Ahead"

The thought of spring is so exciting. After being cooped up all winter, because of cold weather and Covid, we are ready to jump in the boat and head out on the very first *NICE* day. But during Spring-time, when the atmosphere is most 'dynamic,' squall lines are common in our eastern shores. In fact **"bow echo"** or **"bowing line segment"** which is an arched/bowed out-line of

thunderstorms, sometimes are embedded within a squall line can turn our calm day on the water into a battle between you and Mother Nature.

We all know how rough weather can ruin a day on the water. But knowing how to avoid weather problems is important.



**First,** check the weather forecast, preferably on your VHF weather channel and observe the sky before you venture out. Monitor the forecast for strong winds and other weather conditions that could cause rough seas. Strong winds **give waves energy**, and coastal bathymetry (underwater depth of the ocean) can contribute to general shape of breaking waves. When winds blow onshore (from the ocean towards the land), they tend to create a choppy sea surface and also encourage waves to break before they become very steep. Think how these waves will effect your boating experience. Perhaps, if you're unsure you should wait for a better day for your cruise. It is always good practice to NOT venture out when predicted weather conditions exceed your boating skills or your boat's capability to handle deep waves.

**Second,** listen to weather forecasts while on the water. Keep an eye to the west. In our area weather usually changes from that direction. High, dark clouds or a change in wind di-



rection or velocity often predict threatening or rough weather. Even check your AM radio. Electrical activity in the air associated with thunderstorms can cause excessive static on an AM radio.

**Third,** if you find yourself in an approaching rough weather condition find a safe harbor as soon as possible. An approaching storm is a safety concern but it could pass over quickly and you may find on your way.

### Weather Flash: "Spring Storm Approaching" Translates: "Rough Boating Weather Ahead"

Even the best captains can find themselves stuck in bad weather with apparently nowhere to hide. If you're forced to ride out a storm—here are a few safety suggestions:

- All boaters darn Life Jackets. Always dress to avoid exposure and hypothermia.
- Sail boaters fasten safety harnesses to a jack line and reduce the sail area.
- Small boaters, seat your passengers in the bottom of the boat, as close to the centerline as possible.
- Secure and stow away your gear and close hatches and portals to avoid flooding.
- Meet the waves at the most advantageous speed and angle for your boat under existing conditions. In most circumstances, it's best to steer the boat to meet the waves at about a 45-degree angle off the bow—the angle will vary with sea conditions. Do not take the waves on the stern or broadside.
- Also, find the best speed for controlling your boat. Be aware that reducing speed decreases steering control. Selecting the correct speed requires practice and varies with existing conditions.
- Continuously check for water in the bilge; pump it as often as required to keep it dry. Water is heavy and affects boat stability.
- Always know where you are and the location of the closest safe harbor. Choose the safest course—it may not be the shortest route. Always steer away from hazardous ground.
- Consider anchoring which will normally keep your bow into the wind but you may need to increase your scope.
- Beware of locations where current and winds oppose each other. This causes high, pointed waves.
- Make sure your best helmsman is steering the boat.

Reduced speed in rough water can cause additional problems. Remember that waves can affect both the boat's forward movement and how it steers. Seas striking the forward section of the boat tend to decrease its speed through the water, while waves coming up astern can increase speed in short bursts. A boat drifting without power will broach, turning broadside into the waves and increasing the risk of capsizing therefore the helmsmen must continuously adjust steering so the boat is facing into the


wind.

Learning about weather and boating is a necessary safety procedure. Take a **USPS Weather Course or Seminar** that will help you learn more about weather you boat in and how you can enjoy those Spring day on the water without fear of the Spring Storm.
